Course Description and Objectives:

ARTS 4950 provides students with a culminating studio experience for the BFA degree. The thesis project should demonstrate a student's ability to design, execute, defend, evaluate and present the results of a substantial and original research visual arts project. The class is comprised of students majoring in a variety of disciplines. Students are expected to complete a project in their concentration are of the major. Projects are expected to demonstrate a personal aesthetic, individual expression and unique artistic vision.

Simultaneous enrollment in a class related to your are of concentration may enhance your ability to succeed in this course. Overall, you should have a faculty member in your concentration mentoring you concurrently with this course. A journal of your research, readings and process will be maintained all semester. A final thesis presentation along with a 10 page paper is required for the successful completion of this course. You will be expect to present work in progress at a mid semester faculty critique, and then again at a final celebration and presentation.

Topical Outline of the Course Content:

The course requires participation in class critiques, guest lectures, demonstrations, progress reports on research and a final thesis presentation.

Requirements, Expectations, Guidelines:

- Being prepared and on time to all classes.
- More than 1 absence in this course will results in a lowering of your overall grade.
 It is important that you are here and on time for all class and individual meetings
 and participating in the critiques of you're fellow students. Please contact me if you
 cannot attend class after your first excused absence should there be an
 emergency.
- All deadlines must be met.

- Preparation for class discussion and participation will effect your final grade.
 Incomplete grades will not be given unless there are documented medical or family reasons. Failure to complete assignments for any other reason will be reflected in your final grade.
- No texting or calling in class. When students and guests are presenting, critiquing, lecturing, any use of your phones will result in dismissal from the class and an absence. All sounds must be turned off including the vibrate setting.

Grading Policy:

Your final grade will be determined according to the following:

- * Final visual thesis project: 60%
- * Final thesis paper (with proper research and citations: 30%
- * Attendance and Class Participation: 10%

Grading will be based on the following criterion: concept (creativity and ingenuity of your ideas), exploration (how well you apply and pursue your ideas), technical proficiency (no bugs, everything works), aesthetic quality of your work, professionalism, class participation (oral and written), and attendance and punctuality.

Suggestions:

Always back-up everything! You should be saving your visual work in multiple places and documenting your processes as you go.
